# 5 Things Every Arizonan Must Do

Lately, there's been a lot of talk about the need for community leaders and elected officials to tone down the divisive and polarizing dialogue that seems to typify discussion about difficult community and political issues. But what is it that *average, ordinary people* can do to help heal our community and restore our sense of cohesiveness and solidarity in order to take on our common ground issues and concerns? We'd like to suggest the following as a starting point for measuring our individual impact on restoring Arizona's "Civil Culture." Feel free to add to this list!

- 1. **Be an active part of the community you live in!**
  - Do you know your neighbors? If not, go meet them! Make food to share and use it as an occasion to go door to door to meet new neighbors or your closest neighbors that you may not have met.
  - If you are eligible, register to vote, inform yourself about local issues and vote in local, state and national elections. Attend public meetings and read up on the issues to make informed decisions.
  - Get to know who your elected officials are and how to contact them to inform them of your views.
  
- 2. **Volunteer / Serve others**
  - There are innumerable community organizations looking for regular or occasional volunteers. Investigate ways to involve your whole family in regular volunteer activities that speak to an interest or concern that you all share.
  - Make yourself available (within reason) to assist friends and neighbors in need.
  
- 3. **Make sure future grown-ups are part of the solution**
  - If you're a parent, talk to your children about respecting others with differences of opinion, and *lead by example*. Involve them in discussing ways to deal with conflict and disagreement in constructive, bridge-building ways.
  - If you don't have children, get involved with mentoring programs to provide support to young people who may not have good adult role models in their lives.
  
- 4. **Don't take yourself so seriously**
  - When someone disagrees with you, don't take it personally. Refuse to allow the disagreement to escalate into an exchange of personal attacks. Ask questions to really try to understand where the other person is coming from, and show them that while you may not agree with them, you are interested in understanding their point of view.
  - If you're having a bad day, consciously make an effort not to take it out on others.
  
- 5. **Broaden your horizons**
  - Learn about, or get involved with, people that are not like you. Seek out cultural activities or performances that you've not experienced before; read about or take a class on another culture, religion, political ideology, interest, etc.





## Actions to Develop Resources and Address Geographical Challenges

The following action items should be implemented to ensure that resources are available to support civic engagement:

- Unleash the power of the entrepreneurial spirit to encourage civic engagement similar to how for-profit businesses attract customers;
- Utilize available resources and encourage participation in leadership development groups to help nonprofit boards and volunteers learn more about regional issues and civic engagement opportunities;
- Offer free childcare during meetings and civic events;
- Provide for free transportation to community members to encourage attendance at civic events;
- Streamline projects to avoid duplication;
- Develop resources to communicate specific cultural customs;
- Encourage Arizona's politicians and business leaders to promote more national and international businesses to locate in Arizona;
- Continue to have the Secretary of State explore a pilot online voting system;
- Encourage the use of the online petition gathering system for ballot petitions, referenda, and candidates;
- Ensure that government agencies and bodies, businesses, nonprofits, and civic organizations employ bilingual and multi-cultural staff;
- Allow public schools, community colleges, and universities to provide free meeting space to residents and community-based groups and provide funds to subsidize the extra costs incurred by the use of such space; and
- Encourage private institutions and businesses to also provide free meeting space to residents and community-based groups.

## Recomendaciones Continuado:

  - Change Our Voting System. Town Hall encourages the adoption of election reform that facilitates increased voter participation in both primary and general elections. The proposed open primary system may be a significant and positive step forward in accomplishing that goal.

*Alston House*

It is a small house loaded with historical significance. Built in the 1920's, it was both home and office of Dr. Lucius Alston, the first African-American doctor to practice in Mesa. During an era of segregation, Dr. Alston and his wife, Velma, a nurse, treated members of the African-American, Hispanic, and American Indian communities. The City of Mesa acquired the house in 2007 from Valley of the Sun Habitat for Humanity in a swap of land parcels. When the Alston House project is completed, the house will be leased to the Mesa Association of Hispanic Citizens and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Celebration Committee for office and community space.






### Exhibit 1 AM I REGISTERED TO VOTE? | ELECTION SITES WITH REGISTRATION VERIFICATION

Half the states have online registration verification tools.



### Exhibit 2 WHERE CAN I VOTE? | ELECTION SITES WITH POLLING PLACE LOCATORS

Two-thirds of the states have polling place locators on their Web sites, but many of them require the user to enter personal information, and some only work with registered addresses.



NOTE: Both Oregon and Washington have vote-by-mail systems. In Oregon, voters may only vote by mail, while Washington is predominantly vote-by-mail. The Washington site notes that a ballot drop-off locations tool is coming soon.

## 1. Registering to Vote (10 percent)

This subcategory assesses the availability of voter information such as:

- a. Voter registration eligibility
- b. State residency requirements
- c. Voter registration deadlines
- d. How or where to obtain a registration form
- e. How to confirm voter registration
- f. Circumstances that would require updating registration
- g. Whether registration is considered public record
- h. Whether voters in certain circumstances have the right to keep their registration record private
- i. Whether voter registration forms are available online
- j. Registration information for members of the military, overseas citizens, college students, felons, homeless people, those in long-term-care facilities, and voters who are hospitalized

## 2. Ballot Information (7.5 percent)

This subcategory assesses the availability of information voters might need to make informed decisions, such as:

- a. Lists of candidates for federal and state office
- b. Candidates' party affiliation
- c. Candidate contact information (addresses, e-mail addresses, Web addresses, phone numbers)
- d. Candidate occupations
- e. Candidate statements
- f. Candidate incumbency status
- g. State and federal campaign finance data
- h. Political office job descriptions
- i. List of recognized political parties and contact information
- j. Archived candidate information
- k. Ballot measure texts
- l. Ballot measure summaries
- m. Nonpartisan analyses of ballot measures

### 13. WHERE CAN I FIND INFORMATION ON THE BALLOT ISSUES?

If the ballot issue or issues are for a City, Town or School District, then links to the various jurisdictional websites can be found on our "[Elections Calendar](#)" page. Within these jurisdictional websites, detailed information should be provided regarding the ballot issues being offered. If the ballot issue or issues are for a Statewide measure (example: *Propositions*), detailed information regarding those can be found on the Arizona Secretary of State's Office website at [www.azsos.gov](http://www.azsos.gov). In addition, a Publicity Pamphlet or Informational Pamphlet will be mailed, prior to the election, to each voter or, depending on the type of election being conducted, to each household containing a registered voter. The mailing label on the back of the pamphlet will identify your polling place location. The pamphlet will also contain any pro/con arguments filed on a given issue or issues, if applicable.

### 3. Casting a Ballot (7.5 percent)

This subcategory assesses the availability of information to assist users in preparing to cast a ballot, such as:

- a. Voter identification requirements at the polls
- b. Polling places' hours of operation
- c. Tutorials or instructions for completing ballots
- d. Description of state voting systems
- e. Provisional ballot information
- f. Toll-free telephone number to check status of cast provisional ballots
- g. Instructions and information about the availability of voting assistance in languages other than English<sup>2</sup>

#### 7. HOW DO I KNOW WHERE TO VOTE?

The polling place information for a given election is always indicated on the shipping label on the sample ballot that will be sent at least 10 days before the election. In addition, if there are issues appearing on your ballot, then a Publicity or Informational Pamphlet may instead be mailed to you as early as 35 days prior to a given election. This Pamphlet will also contain your polling place information on the shipping label.

If there is a current election being conducted that you qualify to participate in, you can also locate your polling place by visiting our ["Polling Place Locator & Sample Ballots"](#) button on our main ["Election's Homepage"](#). You will need to provide your current residence address information. You may also contact our call center at 602-506-1511 for assistance in locating your polling place.

#### 8. DURING WHAT HOURS ARE THE POLLS OPEN?

## 5. Military and Overseas Absentee Voting (5 percent)

This subcategory assesses the availability of information for military and overseas voters, such as:

- a. Whether a section for military and overseas voters is provided
- b. Registration information for military and overseas voters
- c. Information for verifying voter registration
- d. Registration information for military family members
- e. Re-registration information
- f. Absentee-ballot request renewals
- g. Information on determining if voted ballots have been received
- h. Information on what to do if requested ballots do not arrive

# ELECTION SERVICES, FOR THE SERVICES

**First, thank you for your service!** At Maricopa County Elections we strive to ensure that all eligible voters get the information that they need to effectively participate in our electoral process. Active military, their dependent family members, and voters who are overseas are afforded special consideration under federal (Uniformed & Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act or UOCAVA) and state law in an effort to address the additional obstacles that you face in participating in our democracy. This brochure will aid you in understanding how to submit or verify your registration and current mailing address, to check to ensure that Maricopa County Elections has you designated correctly as a UOCAVA voter if you are not currently in Maricopa County, request a ballot, and check the status of your ballot request to be sure that it is received in time to be counted.

Many services are available electronically at [www.recorder.maricopa.gov](http://www.recorder.maricopa.gov), via email to [milos@risc.maricopa.gov](mailto:milos@risc.maricopa.gov), or by calling 602-506-1511.

If you are currently stationed and residing in Maricopa County, you can either register and vote as a local resident here, or you can register as a UOCAVA voter back in your home jurisdiction by visiting the Federal Voting Assistance Program's website: [www.fvap.gov](http://www.fvap.gov).

## 1 REGISTER

It is important to verify that you are correctly registered in Maricopa County and that we have the right mailing address and contact information to aid in getting you your ballot. This can be done online or by calling 602-506-1511.

If you are not registered and are living locally, simply register as a local resident either online at [www.servicearizona.com](http://www.servicearizona.com) or by requesting a paper form from the phone number listed above.

If you are stationed outside of Arizona then complete a [Federal Post Card Application](#) either obtained on our [website](#) or at [www.fvap.gov](http://www.fvap.gov).

## 2 REQUEST UOCAVA STATUS & BALLOT

In order to expedite serving our military and overseas voters, we need to know that you qualify for this service as well as where you are, and for how long. This status needs to be updated once a year as long as you are active military stationed outside of Maricopa County or you are a voter living overseas (either temporarily or indefinitely). This is done by completing the [Federal Postcard Application \(FPCA\)](#).

UOCAVA voters will automatically be sent a ballot for each election (federal, state, and local) that you are eligible for after you have completed the FPCA. UOCAVA voters' ballots are sent 45 days prior to each election to allow additional time for ballots to travel greater distances than those going to local voters.

## 3 RECEIVE & RETURN BALLOT

UOCAVA voters can request to receive your ballots as a standard paper ballot mailed to them, or you can receive it via fax or electronically. If you have requested a ballot you can determine what date it was sent on our website [www.recorder.maricopa.gov](http://www.recorder.maricopa.gov).

Additionally, UOCAVA voters have options in the return of their voted ballots, but all ballots **MUST BE RECEIVED BACK BY 7PM ARIZONA TIME ON ELECTION DAY**. Ballots can be returned by mail, fax, as an email attachment, or through the Arizona Secretary of State's website: [www.azsos.gov](http://www.azsos.gov).

## HELP US TO HELP YOU!

### KEEP YOUR INFORMATION CURRENT WITH YOUR LOCAL ELECTION'S OFFICE.

- Most election mail is non-forwardable, so be sure that you notify your local office when deployed or mailing information changes.
- If you are not registered to a political party, you need to advise which party's ballot you would like to receive for the August Primary Election.

- Election laws vary by state, be sure to refer fellow soldiers to the Federal Voting Assistance Program's website or to their Secretary of State's office.



## About

The Accessible Voting Technology Initiative is working to:

- Understand the barriers and facilitators to voting for people with disabilities
- Identify gaps where current technology fails to fill user needs and where new solutions can have the most impact
- Work to integrate these changes into the current election environment.

This project will address the needs of voters with different types of disabilities, including individuals with:

- Sensory disability (blindness, low vision, hearing loss, and deafness)
- Cognitive and intellectual disability
- Motor mobility and dexterity disability
- Communication and language-related disability
- Disabilities common among older adults.

**Tasha** is a woman in her 30's who runs her own business. She has been blind since birth. She employs a "reader" who reads print materials to her. However, she uses a computer independently and prefers that method for accessing information.

**George** is a retiree who has MS that affects his memory and his mobility. He uses a cane and can't stand for long periods at a time. Because of his memory problems, he needs to bring notes with him to the polling station about how he is going to vote. He is very concerned about voting privacy — he misses the privacy of the old designs with the curtain.

**Angela** has quadriplegia from a spinal cord injury. She can move her arms somewhat, but is not able to grip items or point. She uses a typing stick, held on to her hand with a splint, when she wants to hit keys on a computer keyboard. Angela uses a power wheelchair and has a service dog. Due to the height of her chair, she frequently bumps her knees when she tries to pull up to work surfaces. She often feels rushed when voting.

**Minjun** (pronounced Min-Joon) has vision loss, including being color blind. As a recent immigrant to the U.S., English is Minjun's second language. Although he can remember who the candidates are from seeing them on TV, he has problems reading their names.

**Charlie** has autism. He is high-functioning and is able to read well. However, he is uncomfortable in crowds and in unfamiliar situations, and he is sensitive to loud noises. He also tends to persevere when doing some tasks, and it is difficult to get him to move on to the next activity.

**Maria** is a retiree who has cerebral palsy that affects her mobility and her dexterity. She uses a scooter and has limited fine motor control. As a result, she has difficulty reaching and grasping objects as well as using interfaces that have small buttons or controls.

**Michael** is a retiree with a significant hearing loss. He uses hearing aids and can lip read if he is within a few feet of the speaker and the lighting is good.

**Amy** is a single working mother who needs to pick up her 1 year old daughter at the daycare center before going to the poll to vote. The child is quite active and tends to wander off in public places. To make sure that her daughter does not wander off, Amy will have to hold her in her arms while she is voting.

**Tyler** is a college student who has a condition that has resulted in blindness since he was a child, and more recently, mobility and fine motor issues that resemble arthritis. He can operate controls and buttons if they aren't too small or too stiff. At home, he uses a computer with speech capability.

## Redistricting, Unresolved

When it comes to predicting turnout, I'm especially good at nailing the number the day after the election.

Until then, of course, it's a guess. I'm usually not that far off, though.

Since the day after the 2008 presidential election, I've been preparing for a drop in Johnson County turnout in 2012, from 78 percent to 75 percent. I just think the 2008 election had an energy level that I didn't think would be repeated in 2012.

If I'm right, though, the story line in the newspapers will be that Photo ID suppressed turnout. Not in effect in 2008, the new Photo ID law will be listed as the reason turnout dropped.

Again, IF I'm right (and we all win if I'm wrong and the turnout is higher), I'll be pointing people back to this post.

Likewise, I point you now to something I've said many places in the past 18 months: "For me photo ID isn't even in the top 10 issues for 2012."

My post on Monday provides a sense of an item on my top 10 list. We're up to about 75 machines that have power supplies "certified fried," by the way. We're still evaluating.

Another worry came with the census and this one may impact turnout negatively and drop my 75 percent prediction.

We have no idea what state races we will have in the August primary. By, "no idea," I mean, we don't know the legislative districts involved, the boundaries, or the candidates.

We don't completely know the election date, even. We thought the August 7 date could be moved by legislative action, but that idea seems to have died.

That puts us a little more than a month away from the last date we can send ballots

Last Friday, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia Circuit issued an [opinion](#) in *Shelby County v Holder*, voting 2-1 to uphold the constitutionality of Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act, which requires certain states and jurisdictions to obtain federal approval of election changes before they can go into effect.

I've already [blogged](#) about the effects of Section 5, especially in the context of current national fights over voter ID - and any change in Section 5 that reduces federal oversight in covered jurisdictions would be significant to the combatants on either side of that and other debates.

South Dakota secretary of state's office steps in to help  
*McPherson County dealing with death of longtime auditor*

The residents of rural **McPherson County, S.D.** — where there's a square mile of land for every three people — knew Steve Serr in a variety of ways.

Some knew him as the voice behind the Eureka Lakeside Ballpark, some knew him through the church choirs he directed and some knew him through the Long Lake Community Band that he also directed.

But where all of McPherson's 18-and over population knew Serr from was the county's auditor office. For almost 30 years, Serr oversaw the elections in this county of about 2,500.

Serr **died unexpectedly** on Saturday May 5. He was 64.

Now, not only is this small community coming to grips with losing a lifelong friend, they are also moving forward and making plans for the June 5 primary election.

"Elections were Steve's favorite part of the auditor's position," said Jenny Guthmiller, who was appointed auditor following Serr's death. "He enjoyed preparing the ballots, testing the equipment, and traveling to the different polling sites the day of the election."

As a result of Serr's death, the McPherson County Commission invoked **South Dakota Law 12-18-41** and requested that the secretary of state's office conduct the June primary.

"Clearly, we are only asked to take a direct hand to ensure the election takes place in an emergency, as we have the utmost confidence in the competence and professionalism of South Dakota's county auditors," **South Dakota Secretary of State Jason Gant** said. "Unfortunately, this is one of those rare situations. Mr. Serr's passing leaves a void, and we all must pitch in and ensure that nothing impedes our ability to conduct the election."

**Senate Bill 130** was signed into law in 2011, and states "If the person charged with the conduct of an election and the governing board determine that an election cannot be conducted, the person charged with the conduct of an election shall sign a declaration of emergency and deliver it to the Secretary of State prior to the election."

# Seven Principles for Getting Out the Vote

Use these tested and studied strategies to successfully get-out-the-vote

## 1 Make it Personal

Voter mobilization research shows that people are more likely to participate when contacted personally by someone they know. Voters respond best to other people, especially friends, neighbors, and community-based agencies that are familiar and trusted. Rather than focusing on impersonal handouts or mass emails, look for opportunities to initiate conversations about voting while delivering services, in meetings, on the phone, or at trainings and events.

## 2 Make it Easy

Voters can let little things keep them from the polls. Not having basic information about the election—like when the polls are open, how to find your polling location if you've recently moved, or what kind of identification is necessary—can create participation barriers. Fortunately, nonprofits are well equipped to help voters get the information they need to vote with confidence.

## 3 Competition Counts

Competition drives turnout. Voters respond when they perceive that an election is competitive or high profile. You can encourage this by highlighting closely contested candidate races or ballot measures.

## 4 Timing is Everything

Get-out-the-vote efforts have the greatest impact in the final weeks and days leading up to the election when voters who are less likely to turn out pay more attention. Designate a day for a big early voting push. Then pump up the volume in the final week and on Election Day itself!

## 5 Picture It

People are more likely to vote if they visualize their plan to do so. Will they request a mail ballot or vote early in person? What time will they head to the polls on Election Day? Ask people to think specifically about when and how they plan to vote.

## 6 The Power of Positivity

Negative messaging—like "If you don't vote, don't complain"—or calls to civic duty without additional information about the election can be confusing and counterproductive. Use positive messages that encourage people to vote by connecting the election back to your community's future and your organization's issues.

## 7 Raising the Stakes

Voters respond to urgency. If the election seems important, people are more likely to turn out because they believe that their vote will make a difference, benefit them, or avoid negative results. Use your mission and core issues to highlight what's at stake.

### Get-Out-the-Vote Efforts Pay Dividends

Voting is contagious. Research shows that if you persuade one person to vote, they will likely influence at least one additional friend or family member to vote too. [Voting is habit-forming](#). Casting a ballot for the first or second time can instill a lifelong voting habit.

## A DOZEN EASY WAYS TO GET OUT THE VOTE!


With limited time and resources, here are some ways you can quickly and easily help Get Out The Vote without spending a dime.

- Talk to the people you work with about the importance of voting to your organization and the community you serve.
- Put a newsletter article on your web site, in any agency newsletter or e-news that goes out close to Election Day, encouraging everyone to vote. (See *sample article on our website.*)
- Send emails to your staff, members, consumers or clients, board, and volunteers encouraging them to vote. (See *sample emails that you can use or modify on our website.*)
- Make a VOTE TODAY! sign and place it in your main lobby and other common areas on Election Day with information about polling places, rides to the polls and an 800 number to call or website to visit for help voting.
- Include a VOTE NOVEMBER 6! reminder in the payroll envelopes that go out closest to Election Day. (See *sample payroll stuffer on our website.*)
- Do an "office knock" on the day before Election Day—make the rounds in your agency offices and remind your colleagues to VOTE ON NOVEMBER 6.
- New voters may need more help and encouragement to vote. Do another "office knock" on Election Day—make the rounds one more time to ask your colleagues what help they need, questions they have to VOTE TODAY.
- Car pool to the polls with co-workers, board member, volunteers, or clients who live in your precinct—on your way to work, on a morning break, on your lunch hour, or after work. Make it fun and social!
- Include a VOTE NOVEMBER 6 card in any group meetings or programs that your agency holds in the month leading up to Election Day (including staff and board meetings!)
- Make a VOTE NOVEMBER 6! message on your outdoor marquis or in your agency's window so that passersby are reminded to vote.
- Put a VOTE NOVEMBER 6 message in your email signature so that every email you send reminds people to vote.
- Take time off on Election Day—or even part of it!







Using Census 2010 Population 18 and Over and Voter Registration from May 20<sup>th</sup>, 2012








# 2010 Elección General en Guadalupe

## Provisional Ballot Percentages





# Frightening FAQ

## Who can organize Trick or Vote events?

## Can I organize a Trick or Vote event for a candidate?



When you turn on the television, read the newspaper or surf the Internet, you see and hear candidates who are campaigning across the United States in hopes of winning the Republican Party nomination. The Republican nominee will run against President Barack Obama in the presidential election on November 6.

You might ask yourself, "Why is this important to me?"

As a Native American constituent, it is your constitutional right as an individual of this nation to choose a candidate who supports Native American issues. If people in the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community (SRPMIC) have strong opinions or concerns about what is going on in Congress, Washington, D.C., or even here within the Community, then they have the obligation to make their voices heard and the right as citizens to vote and make a difference.

During the last SRPMIC Tribal Council meeting on March 14, Council Member Deanna Scabby gave a report on her recent trip to Washington, D.C. She went there along with SRPMIC Vice-President Martin Harvier, Gila River Indian Community Lt. Governor Stephen Roe Lewis and three of the Gila River Council members. They informed members of Congress about their position on H.R. 2938, the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands Replacement Clarification Act, introduced by Rep. Trent Franks of Arizona. The bill amends the Gila Bend Indian Reservation Lands Replacement Act to prohibit class II or III gaming activities on lands that the Tohono O'odham Nation was authorized to purchase in Arizona in exchange for granting the federal government all right, title and interest to the Gila Bend Indian Reservation.



### **TIPS ON ORGANIZING A VOTER REGISTRATION DRIVE**

**10. Can we offer special prize drawings, raffles, competitions or giveaways to get people to register?**

NO. There are firm legal restrictions against giving away anything in exchange for registering to vote. You may, however, have giveaway items that are available to anyone that wants them (i.e. candy, literature, pens, posters, etc.) whether or not that person wants to register to vote or is registered to vote.

### **COMMON QUESTIONS & CONCERNS**

**15. Is it true that registering to vote puts you on jury lists?**

Technically yes. However, you're probably already on the list anyway. Voter rolls are only one of several ways that juror lists are obtained, so not registering to vote is no ticket to avoid being summoned for jury duty.

**16. Are poll-workers paid or volunteer**

Service on Election Day as a poll worker is paid work, as is the training session, and it is a great experience for new and seasoned voters.

**17. How often do you have to re-register?**

You only have to register once to be eligible to vote in school district, city, county, state and federal elections. You do not have to re-register unless:

- A. You move.
- B. You change your name.
- C. You want to change or drop your political party affiliation.





## Why American Indians Should Vote

The decisions made at all levels of government affect Indian people—we need to vote to ensure that our issues will be heard. Collectively we can make change happen.

### 1. Honor

Honor your right to vote. Indians in Arizona fought to have their right to vote recognized. American Indians became citizens of the United States in 1924, but were not granted suffrage until 1948.



### 2. Trust

The Federal government has what is termed a trust obligation to provide funding and services to Tribes. Too often, this trust has been broken. By taking political action and casting votes, we continue the struggle to make sure the Federal government fulfills its trust obligation to American Indians.

### 3. Disparity/Access

Tribes in Arizona experience some of the greatest needs for jobs, housing, health care, education, and other human services. If Indian citizens do not vote then it is significantly more difficult to address these issues. If Indian citizens will not vote, then the struggles of our elders and past generations to address these issues can be lost and their sacrifices made meaningless.

### Letter From the Executive Director



#### The Amazing Power of One.

As I sit in the Arizona House Judiciary Committee waiting to testify on our legislation to reform voting rights and guardianship law in Arizona, I am compelled to share this moment of how individuals really can step forward to make a difference in our world.

I just heard Rep. Doris Goodale (R-Kingman) and Committee Chair Eddie Farnsworth (R-Gilbert) each say they are voting for this bill because of Clint Gode.

Clint is Rep. Goodale's constituent. He lives in Lake Havasu, Arizona. He has been active in the self-advocacy movement for many years and he wants to vote but can't because of the very law we are trying to change today. His dad, Art, is a member of the ACDL Board of Directors. Art lives in Kingman and has dedicated his life to making sure his son has every opportunity for independence and success in life.

Clint and Art came to me in the fall and asked me to take another chance (because we had last failed in 2005) so that Clint could vote. Clint and Art arranged a meeting with Rep. Goodale and I went to Kingman to discuss Arizona law while Clint explained his desire to vote. Clint's voice was more powerful in that room that day than mine.

After I testified for the bill, the voice that was heard during the vote was Clint's, not mine. That is the amazing power one person can have to make a difference in our world.

We passed HB 2377 out of the Arizona House Judiciary Committee by a 7-0 vote. This was just the first step in a long process.







## 501(c)3 Permissible Election Activities Checklist

A 501(c)3 organization may not conduct partisan activities to support or oppose any candidate for public office, including -

- Endorse a candidate
- Make a campaign contribution to or an expenditure for a candidate
- Rate candidates on who is most favorable to their issue
- Let candidates use any of its facilities or resources, unless those resources are made equally available to all candidates at their fair market value

**Nonprofits “are allowed to conduct nonpartisan activities that educate the public and help them participate in the electoral process (such as) voter education, voter registration and get-out-the-vote drives and candidate forums.”**

There is a wide range of nonpartisan activities a nonprofit may engage in to encourage voter participation and promote voter education. Among the most common are to:

- ➔ Educate Voters on the Process of Voting
- ➔ Encourage and Remind People to Vote
- ➔ Participate in Get-Out-the-Vote Activities
- ➔ Conduct or Promote Voter Registration\*
- ➔ Become a Poll Worker or Volunteer at the Polls
- ➔ Distribute Nonpartisan Sample Ballots, Candidate Questionnaires or Voter Guides
- ➔ Sponsor a Candidate Forum
- ➔ Educate the Candidates on Your Issues
- ➔ Advocate for Your Issues During an Election
- ➔ Support or Oppose Ballot Measures as a Lobbying Activity

## Kids Voting Arizona Family Guide

When you take your kids to vote, democracy becomes a family affair. It promotes family conversation, what you stand for, what you believe in, what your hopes are for our country and culminates in the historic act of going to the voting booth to cast a ballot for elected representatives. Studies suggest that parents exert tremendous influence over future voting patterns of their children. **If parents vote regularly, their children are far more likely to vote when they become adults.** Chances are, if you take your kids to the polls, they'll remember it. Democracy makes a good first impression!

- ▶ **Choose an issue** - Find one that affects your kids directly - the environment, or education for example - then follow it through the media, keeping track of what is said and by whom. Discuss with your children each candidate's views on these issues.
- ▶ **Take a walk around the neighborhood** - Take your family on a stroll through your neighborhood and note the political advertising and campaign signs that you see. How many different campaigns can your kids identify?
- ▶ **Review the advertising** - What messages are the candidates communicating in their ads? Ask your kids about the advertising - is it negative, warm and fuzzy, humorous or scary? Which type of ads do they remember and why?
- ▶ **Family History** - Have your kids talk to older members of the family about their voting histories. Who was the first presidential candidate they voted for? Who were their all-time favorite candidates, and did they win or lose?
- ▶ **Contact the candidates** - Encourage your child to write a letter or an e-mail to a candidate. Go to [www.vote-smart.org](http://www.vote-smart.org) for specific candidates to get their contact information. Just type in your zip code for updated information on the candidates running in your area.
- ▶ **Find your Legislative and Congressional district.**
- ▶ **Go to the polls** with your kids.



### Resources for Voters

One of EAC's primary mandates under the **Help America Vote Act** is to serve as a central resource for information about elections. Through EAC's national clearinghouse, the public will find information about topics such as registering to vote and serving as a poll worker along with studies on how, where and when we vote.

EAC is also responsible for maintaining the **National Mail Voter Registration form**, which can be used in any state to register to vote in a federal election. EAC also provides information about registering to vote and contact information for each state election office.

#### A Voter's Guide to Federal Elections

Our Voter's Guide is designed to help voters successfully navigate the federal elections process, from registering to vote to casting a ballot on Election Day.

In addition to the basics of casting a ballot, it also includes information on voter eligibility, registering to vote, early voting, and the voting process for military and civilians living abroad, along with polling place services that make voting more accessible.

The Voter's Guide is available in 11 languages: Cherokee, Chinese, Dakota, English, Japanese, Korean, Navajo, Spanish, Tagalog, Vietnamese, and Yupik.

**Register to Vote!**

Use the National Mail Voter Registration Form to register to vote, update your registration information with a new name or address, or register with a political party.

Note: If you wish to vote absentee and are a uniformed service member or family member or a citizen living outside the U.S., contact the **Federal Voting Assistance Program** to register to vote.


