New for 2014

Party?

- Even years are partisan years with local, state, and federal races on the ballot and Primary Election hinging on party affiliation.
- Party recognition begins with the petition process and is retained through registration numbers:
 - A political party is required to have at least five percent of the total number of votes cast for governor or presidential electors.
 - In addition, parties are entitled to continued representation on the ballot if they maintain two-thirds of one percent of the total number of registered voters.
- Recent legislation provides recognition through 2 election cycles for parties recognized after the legislation was passed.

Americans Elect: Recognized (?)

- Americans Elect could still be a recognized party even though they do not have 21,499 registered voters due to the new legislation.
- However, the Secretary of State's office received notification that they did not wish to have that status.
- Two groups have now come forward stating that they are the official Americans Elect party and DO wish for recognition.

Americans Elect: Recognized (?)


- The SOS Office has advised the two factions that they will have to have a court determination to proclaim who is, in fact, the “Americans Elect Party”.
- Stay tuned.

Green Party: Not Recognized (?)

- The Green Party did not retain party status based on voter registration as they did not have the 21,499 necessary.
- They currently have 5,601 voters registered statewide as of 10/1/2013.
- They are still able to regain status by submitting petitions to the Secretary of State by February 27, 2014.
- They need 23,041 signatures.

Petition Verification Reminder

- Party recognition requires full petition verification, not just a random sample (as is done for referendums and initiatives).
- Same as recall petitions.



Primary Reminder

- In the August Primary, voters who are registered to a recognized party receive that party's ballot.
- Voters who are not can request the party's ballot, or a nonpartisan ballot if they live in a municipality also having an election.
- We will discuss Federal Only ballots shortly...

Primary Change

- **NOW** that more municipalities will have candidates on the ballot coinciding with the federal, state, and other local races,
- **AND** given that cities and towns have the option of conducting their elections by mail,
- **SINCE** we will have unaffiliated voters who are not receiving the PEVL 90 Day notice they will need to be notified to select what ballot they would like mailed to them.

Primary Change

- MCED will be mailing out to voters in those circumstances a notification.
- This will be one of the items we will look at in the spring to discuss formatting, wording, etc.



Primary Changes: Libertarian Party

- The Libertarian Party notified Secretary Bennett in March of 2013 that they intended to open up their primary to unaffiliated voters.
- Unaffiliated voters can now select a Libertarian ballot if they so choose.



Federal Only Ballot

- As we discussed previously, the implementation of a Federal Only ballot and Federal Only registered voter will be in place for 2014.
- The Secretary of State's Procedures Manual is being updated to reflect the changes.
- So, lets walk through that process as it currently stands by looking at the updated *Voter Registration Workshop* that will be posted on our website when this is finalized.



Federal Registration Form:

- Accepted by all 50 states & territories.
- Does not require documentation of citizenship, but does require identifying information (field #6).
- Unidentified voters must vote in person the first time they vote.

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#6: Proof of Identity



- NEW registrants to Maricopa County must provide *proof* of identification when using the Federal Registration Form to establish they are eligible to register to vote.
- If a voter is registered in the county and is updating registration (with new name, address, political party, etc.) they DO NOT have to provide documentation.
- If the registrant is unsure if they are already registered, it is to their benefit to include the documentation in case they are not registered.



Proper *Identification* Numbers to provide:


- AZ Driver License *or* Non-operating Identification *or*
- Bureau of Indian Affairs Number, Indian Census number, Tribal Treaty Card Number, or Tribal Enrollment Number *or*
- Alien Registration Number off of Naturalization Certificate *or*
- *The last four digits of their Social Security Number—this will aid in identifying the voter and is acceptable on the Federal Form.*
- *If the voter does not have a unique ID number, write “NONE” in field #6 and the Secretary of State’s office will assign one.*

These 3 all verify citizenship too & get the voter a full ballot



Proper *Identification* Numbers to provide:



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

Proper *Identification* to provide:

- Birth Certificate *or* Applicable pages of a United States Passport *or* Current Utility bill, Bank Statement, Government check, paycheck *or* Government document that shows the name and address.



These 2 verify citizenship and get the voter a full ballot.



Proper *Identification* to provide:

- *or Current Utility bill, Bank Statement, Government check, paycheck or Government document that shows the name and address.*

These are available options for the Federal Form, but NOT for the State Form





Identification & Citizenship

- When the information from the voter validates their *citizenship* status, they are eligible for a **FULL BALLOT**.
- When the information from the voter *identifies* them, but does not their citizenship status, they are eligible for a **FEDERAL ONLY BALLOT**.

Citizenship

- AZ DL or Non-operating ID number
- Tribal ID number
- A-number from naturalization process
- Copy of passport
- Copy of birth certificate
- Copy of other state's ID that designates citizenship status on its face (IE HI Attorney General issued ID)





Important Distinction:

- Until the recent SCOTUS ruling and subsequent AZ AG opinion, identified fed-form voters were placed on the rolls and eligible for a full ballot.
- That is no longer true unless citizenship information is also provided.
- Just giving the SSN on the fed form= fed only ballot.

Important to Remember:

- The Fed form is being used targeting the student/university population, particularly those from out of state as they do not have an AZ DL so just the SSN is being provided.
- When the SSN identifies the voter they get a federal only ballot.
- We have cautioned how to best service this voting population and ensuring they want to register at school versus at home and vote absentee.

- This student registered in AZ using a Fed form.
- Went back to CA & tried to enroll in summer classes locally.
- Noted was registered in AZ on application and denied in-state tuition in CA (also pays out of state in AZ).

Arizona Voter Registration



Federal Form By the Numbers

- From August 1, 2012 to October 7, 2013 Maricopa County received **426,766** voter registration forms: both state and federal forms for new, and existing, voters.
- Approximately **3%** of voter registration forms received by Maricopa County each year are Federal Voter Registration forms. During the period from August 6, 2012 to the morning of October 17, 2013, Maricopa County received **12,651** Federal Voter Registration forms.

Voter Registration Forms 8/1/2012-10/7/2013




Federal Form By the Numbers

8/6/2012-10/17/2013

- 4,697, or 37%, were existing voters on the voter file using the Federal Form to update their information.
- 3,020, or 24%, were new applicants who provided their Arizona driver's license number.
- 180, or 1%, provided other information which satisfied the proof of citizenship requirement for the voter.
- 378, or 3%, were not residents of Maricopa County either listing addresses in another county in Arizona, or in another state in the Union.
- 4,264, or 34%, did not provide identifying information in the field for a driver's license number, which would have satisfied the proof of citizenship requirement, when first submitting their application and were placed on suspense

Federal Form By the Numbers

8/6/2012-10/17/2013

- Of the 4264 who did not initially provide ID:
 - 3,159, or 74%, provided proof of citizenship later
 - 954, or 22%, of the registrants are still on suspense awaiting identification
 - 151, or 4%, of these registrants provided insufficient information (such as a nonexistent address, incomplete date of birth, or lack of signature)

Costs? Primary:

- For the primary election, there will have to be new federal-only ballot styles prepared for the 724 precincts and 5 recognized parties (potentially), resulting in a calculation of 3,620 additional ballot styles. For each additional ballot style, there is a fee of \$43.32, which results in a total cost of **\$156,818.40**.
- For a minimum of 25 ballots per precinct, the total number of additional ballots that will have to be printed is 90,500. At a printing cost of \$0.40 per ballot, the printing cost will total **\$36,200.00**.

Costs? General:

- For the general election, there will be 724 new ballot styles, accounting for one new federal-only ballot style for each of the 724 precincts, resulting in a design cost of **\$31,363.68**.
- To print a minimum of 25 ballots pre precinct, the printing cost will be **\$7,240.00**.
- TOTAL:
- The printing costs for the primary and general election therefore will be increased by a total of **\$231,622.08**

Costs? Testing & Duplication:

- In addition to these estimated costs, the Elections Department will also have to print additional ballots for the logic and accuracy testing done by the Secretary of State's Office before the primary and general elections.
- Also, the Elections Department performs logic and accuracy testing on each precinct's optical scan machines and will have to print ballots for those tests as well.
- Additional ballots will have to be printed for the duplication process as well.

Costs? Mailings:

- The Elections Department is also planning two additional mailings to go out to each voter who is currently registered using the Federal Form without providing evidence of citizenship. Currently, there are approximately 954 registered voters in this situation. The Elections Department estimated that the cost for these mailings will be **\$5,040** based on the cost of printing the letters and envelopes and applying postage for an estimated 1,000 voters.

Costs? TBD:

- All of the required IT changes and modifications to:
 - Voter Registration System
 - Election Management System (EMS) to designate impacted voters, make restrictions on their abilities to request ballots in local races, and generate reports
 - Inter & Intranet lookup tools
- Additional staffing costs for layout of thousands of additional ballot styles;
- Additional staffing costs for proofing thousands of additional ballot styles;
- Additional staffing costs for logic and accuracy testing of thousands of additional ballot styles;
- Additional training of poll workers, Election Day field troubleshooters, temporary and permanent staff at front counters and the call center; and
- Increases costs related to provisional ballot processing.

Costs?

- We estimate the additional costs to be between \$75-100,000 (on top of the almost \$250,000).
- We will keep you apprised of the ongoing litigation...




The Good News (& yes, there is good news)

- MCED purchased ePollbooks that will take much of the guesswork out of the ballot distribution at the polls by boardworkers.
- We piloted them in the November 2013 election.
- We will be going over the ePollbooks next spring.






