Polls opened at 6 a.m. Tuesday for Arizona's primary election, which will set the field for races from [U.S. Senate](#) to local constable.

Polls are open until 7 p.m. Voters must bring identification with them to the polls, either one piece of valid identification that contains a photo, such as a driver's license; or two pieces of ID if there is no photo, such as a voter ID card, utility bill or recent bank statement.

Secretary of State Ken Bennett is projecting a turnout of 20 to 25 percent.

Elections results will start to roll out at 8 p.m., when the early-ballot tally is released. Results will be available on the Secretary of State's website, as well as at [www.results.azcentral.com](http://www.results.azcentral.com).

The primary results will determine the nominees of Arizona's various [political parties](#) for statewide and local offices. The general election is Nov. 2.

In addition, cities around the Valley are holding council elections. They include Chandler, El Mirage, Glendale, Mesa and Peoria. For those elections, contact your local city hall for polling and other election-related information.



## Security



- MCTEC goes into lock-down mode once we have live ballots in the building.
- All access is through the front lobby with the exception of the dock doors for warehouse crews.
- Security guards are stationed between the public lobby and ballot processing with camera observance of all hallways and doors to the facility.

Arizona will have 2,200 polling places on Election Day, and 14,000 people are needed to work the polls from 5:30 a.m. to 8 p.m.


Workers can earn between \$75 to \$100 per day. Those with experience can make \$110 to \$125 per day.

Poll workers are needed to check in voters and check their identification, help voters with the voting unit and to issue voters regular and provisional ballots.







This refers to the change in the precinct bilingual board worker allocation formula for Maricopa County, Arizona, submitted to the Attorney General pursuant to Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, 42 U.S.C. 1973c. We received your response to our May 25, 2010, request for additional information on June 8, 2010; supplemental information was received through July 20, 2010.


The Attorney General does not interpose any objection to the specified change. However, we note that Section 5 expressly provides that the failure of the Attorney General to object does not bar subsequent litigation to enjoin the enforcement of the change. Procedures for the Administration of Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, 28 C.F.R. 51.41.

## 'Voter Apathy' Could Mean Low Primary Turnout

PHOENIX - The candidates in several heated races will be decided Tuesday, and there's a lot at stake. Normally we've seen a lot of interest in primary races, but election officials are predicting **low voter turnout** – why?

With all the publicity and airtime, you'd think voters would be rushing to the polls, but that may not be the case.

The Secretary of State's Office is expecting 20-25 percent of voters to hit the polls Tuesday. That's because turnout is typically low in an off-year election, in between presidential election years, and because the primary is in August, instead of September, and many Arizona snowbirds haven't returned to the valley yet.


PHOENIX - Eddie Ventura made sure to cast a ballot in Arizona's primary elections but didn't have much company at his polling place near 36th Street and McDowell Road in Phoenix.

"It's very sad," said Ventura of the low turnout. "Every one of us can make a difference, impacting the community and helping the country."

For every person like Ventura who did vote, experts say another four voters did not.

And on a day where the temperature exceeded 110 degrees, Mother Nature didn't help boost turnout.

"It's the heat," said Paul Lewis, referring to the reason for the low turnout. "The heat has a lot to do with it."

## Voter Turnout in Arizona Primary Exceeds Expectations

PHOENIX - All the ballots have been counted and recorded! Gathering results for the Arizona primary went smoothly, according to the Maricopa County Elections Director.

"About 75 percent of the people voted by mail and the other 25 or so voted from the precincts, but the tabulation went well, we had a big storm on election night and that slowed things down for a little while, but we were able to recover," says Karen Osborn.

Statewide, nearly 934,000 ballots were cast.

The Secretary of State's Office says voter turnout was nearly 31 percent, which is higher than expected. Election officials were predicting somewhere between **20 and 25 percent**, but some heavily-publicized races may have drew voters to the polls.

Final, unofficial results are **available now**. A state canvass to certify official election results for federal, statewide and legislative races is scheduled for Sept. 7. No recounts are expected.








# Statewide County Comparison Turnout % of Eligible Voters




# Turnout of Eligible Maricopa County Voters





## Voting Method by Party (in # of ballots cast):




## Lets talk party & PCs for a minute.

- In precincts where we did not have a contested precinct committeeman/person (PC) race we were able to cancel the election and all candidates were elected outright.
- Those precincts only had one version of each party's ballot.
- In precincts where there was a contested race only registered Dems & Reps were able to vote in the PC contest so there were 2 styles of party ballots

## Lets talk party & PCs for a minute.

- There were 2 precincts with Democratic races & 90 with Republican races.
- By cancelling the 2192 remaining elections we were able to save hundreds of thousands of dollars—estimated to be between *\$350,000 to \$500,000*.
- We also had nonpartisan ballots available in the cities and towns having local elections which allowed for voters who did not want to participate in a party's primary to still vote on the local issues.










# Ballots cast at Early Voting Sites




- Special Election Boards (SEBs) went out to 45 different care facilities and nursing homes as well as to approximately 25 personal homes to assist voters casting their early ballots.

## Early Voting the O'odham way

- MCED encourages voters in the San Lucy District to bring their Early Ballots to the Elders Center the Tuesday before every election for assistance.
- Mr. Lester Luna translates for the Elders and aids MCED in answering questions the Elders may have.
- Some voters chose to mail back their ballots while others drop off their ballot in a sealed ballot box which is brought directly back to our office.




# UOCAVA: A Maricopa Military Voter in Korea








- We had 2 facilities deny us the week before the election when we tried to deliver the polling place equipment.

High humidity and climbing temperatures have sparked an excessive heat warning for the Phoenix area that is expected to last until Wednesday evening.

Afternoon temperatures are expected to range from 105 to 112 degrees during the next three days. Humidity is also relatively high, according to [National Weather Service](#).

than usual. Literally. Temperatures of around 110 degrees in the Valley (and hit 115) appear to be keeping many voters out of the heat and humidity, state officials said.

Gov. Jan Brewer's Republican challenger J.D. Hayworth, who got the support of many Party groups around the state, then faltered after McCain allowed him appearing in commercials that touted "free money" grants.

"The heat 'could dampen turnout, we just don't know,' said Matthew Benson, an Arizona Secretary of State's office. The office is projecting about 20 percent of the state's primary elections. Arizona has 3 million registered voters, which could be on par with years past.

More than half its votes to have already been cast through early voting, or through mail-in ballots.

The heat has meant a slow day at the polls in the state.

"I was working the polling stations so excited to see me when I voted today," said Mr. Benson, who voted in Scottsdale.


If power has not been restored by the time the polls close please follow all the standard processes:

1. Edge will be running on power and should be able to close under standard procedures.
2. Insight will not be able to be close. Follow regular process for removal of memory pack and sealing. **SIGN** and place the Insight tape with the pack.
3. Ballots in Door #2 will go in the black bag as normal (there will not be a second results tape for the black bag)
4. Ballots in Door #3 have not been counted, and will need to go in the Misread/Unread envelope. There will be more than normal. Have BWs write on the outside of the envelope that their power was out. These are LIVE ballots and have not been counted. They go in the GREEN bag.












## Voters who went to the wrong Polling Place







# Comparison of % of Provisionals which did not count to the total ballots cast in the election:





## And then there was the recount!

- Kyrene Justice of the Peace race was 8 votes apart.
- The first thing you do is isolate which precincts are contained in the district and then start locating ballots:
  - Black ballot bags from the polling place
  - Early voting ballots
  - Ballots pulled for the hand audit
  - Write in ballot envelopes
  - Edge votes

# More lookin'





- After opening just the boxes labeled with the districts & manually extracting those batches we were still missing some ballots.
- So we went back and ran all the ballots through the machine to sort out the applicable precincts.
- This located the missing ballots in cases where the precinct number and the number of ballots in the batch had gotten transposed on the label on the outside of the box, or one or two ballots had gotten mixed into the batch above or below it in the storage box, or a batch got missed in a box with numerous batches.





- There were numerous court challenges which also impacted who would move on to the General Ballot.
- Eventually it all got determined just in time for us to begin sending out the UOCAVA (Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act) voter's ballots on September 18<sup>th</sup>.
- Because of the timing and to ensure compliance with the MOVE Act, we:



- Bumped up mailing of the 937 domestic military from bulk rate to first class.
- Overseas voters (both military and civilian) are mailed via DHL
